This course will examine the way race developed and continues to function as a central organizing principle in a variety of places around the world. We will examine the origins of racial thinking, the specific and general ways race structures ideology and policy, and the intersections of race, global capital, gender, environment, religion, citizenship, sexuality, and other locations of inequality and domination. We will explore specific histories, locations, and 'ways of being' that define boundaries locally and globally. We will center tourism, enabling us to explore the ways race (whiteness) has intersected with globalization (colonization, capitalism, neoliberalism) to create emigration patterns and tourism industries that mirror deep settler colonization.

This course combines two disciplines that will enable students to explore and learn: Sociological theory and practice and Journalistic interviewing, observation, and document search techniques.
